SUBJECT: Now is the time to establish a Canadian Youth Climate Corps

Dear Prime Minister Trudeau,

Summer 2023 was the worst Canadian wildfire season on record. 18.5 million hectares of forest went up in flames, and thousands were forced to evacuate from their homes. Other extreme weather events like the massive flooding in British Columbia; more frequent and more severe

storms in the Maritimes; heatwaves in southern Ontario, BC, and Quebec; and massive droughts in the prairies have become a normal part of life in Canada. We are in a climate crisis.

We have heard from so many young people from across the country who have expressed their fears about their future. These extreme weather events are part of their reality, and they know that governments are not doing enough to keep our climate below the 1.5 °C threshold. According to a study cited in Nature last year, out of 10,000 young people across 10 countries, 84% expressed that they are worried about climate change, and over half reported being very or extremely worried. This makes sense when pollution from the oil and gas industry increases every year, and as we get closer and closer to runaway climate change.

But we have also heard from many young people across Canada that they want to be engaged in a collective effort to confront the climate crisis. They want to help respond to extreme weather events, they want to help build more resilient communities and ecosystems. And most importantly, they want to help drive down our GHG emissions. But they are waiting for an invitation from their government to meet this generation challenge.

To engage young people in climate solutions, American President Joe Biden announced an American Climate Corps in the fall of 2023. The US climate corps aims to mobilize young people, create new jobs, support conservation efforts, and address the climate crisis. It will train people to develop skills necessary for the clean energy sector, climate resilient infrastructure, and conservation. President Biden's Climate Corps will also offer education funding to youth who serve, promoting education in key sectors for the future.

Young Canadians cannot be left out of this opportunity and pivotal moment in history. Through a large-scale national program, young people under 35 could serve their country and community through a climate corps, even as they acquire vital new skills. This would put youth on a path to good, well-paying unionized jobs and would secure not only their own individual futures but the future of our country and planet.
